A home for Māori?

Rental accommodation

- 1986: 41%
- 2013:
 - 77% of Māori
 - 40% Māori 55+

Landlords

- Private landlords, trusts, businesses

42 older Māori, 55+

- 18 men, 24 women
- 26 aged 55-59 yrs

Life in Renting

Growing up

- Rented (52.4%)
- Owner-Occupiers (66.7%)

Current accommodation

- <2 to >10 years



Tamati's story

When he was growing up Tamati said his whānau moved all the time, all over the place. He currently lives in a camping ground after having nowhere else to go when he was released from prison two years ago. He says he had no choice, "it was either this or live under a bridge" ...



Current Move

Reasons

- Whānau, necessity
- Affordability, opportunities

Decision-making

- Whānau

I made the decision with help from my children and extended whanau. I was unemployed and had nowhere that I would afford to go to. – Hoani, tane, 55-64 years

- Support staff

Most had no problems



Big messages

- Most liked their current home
- Over half would not change anything
- Most were not considering moving
- Home ownership was not an option for a third
